Workshop 1 – Refugees & Asylum Seekers: A Celebration of Courage and Achievements

Australia has long provided refuge to those who have had to flee their country of origin and prides itself on being a cultural mosaic. But for some the words 'refugee' and 'asylum seeker' conjures up negative stereotypes. Misinformation and political debate on border protection is overshadowing the positive contributions refugees make to society.

This workshop will seek to address any misconceptions about refugees and asylum seekers and provide an opportunity for celebrating the courage and often unrecognised achievements of people who are inspirational role models and community leaders.

The workshop will also acknowledge their positive contributions in building a cohesive and prosperous city, counter negative portrayals and stereotypes and inspire attendees to collaborate on building connections with newly-arrived people.

Facilitator: Ms Dalal Smiley, Chief Executive Officer, Wellsprings for Women Panellists:

Ms Be Ha – Be Ha escaped from Vietnam in 1979 with her family on a small fishing boat. The boat floated for a month, starved of food and water and fighting off deadly pirate attacks, before being rescued by a British cargo vessel.

Mr Simon Landid – Imprisoned and tortured by the Sudanese INF in 2001 for organising a bible exhibition at a University campus, Simon Landid managed to flee to Egypt where he sought asylum for three years.

Ms Nayran Tabiei – Forced to flee Syria with her husband and young daughter, Nayran travelled to Lebanon, then Thailand, and finally made the dangerous journey by boat to Australian waters in 2012.

Workshop 2 – Voices of Youth: My Faith, My Generation

Workshop 4 – Child Safe Standards and the Reportable Conduct

From 1 January 2017, religious and faith-based organisations that provide services for children are required to comply with **Child Safe Standards**. These standards aim to drive cultural change in organisations so that protecting children from abuse is embedded in everyday thinking and practice. The standards are compulsory but not prescriptive. This allows religious organisations flexibility in how they implement the standards to meet the requirements.

From 1 January 2018, religious and faith-based organisations are required to comply with the **Reportable Conduct Scheme** and respond to allegations of reportable conduct, and misconduct that may include reportable conduct, made against their workers and volunteers, by investigating those allegations and reporting to the Commission for Children and Young People.

If you are part of a religious and faith-based organisation that is required by law to be compliant with **Child Safe Standards and the Reportable Conduct Scheme**, this is an information session to support your knowledge and implementation. We all have an obligation to do the best we can to keep children safe from harm and abuse.

The workshop will include an interactive style discussion on practical case studies to illustrate the application of the Scheme.

THE INTERFAITH NETWORK OF THE CITY OF GREATER DANDENONG



"MANY FAITHS, ONE PEOPLE"

The Interfaith Network [IFN] of the City of Greater Dandenong has been unique in the life of the City. Consisting of leaders of the Baha'i, Buddhist, Christian, Hindu, Islamic, Jewish and Sikh faiths and their communities together with the spiritual organisations of the Sri Sathya Sai and the Brahma Kumaris, the IFN continues to work for peace, harmony and understanding in the City of Greater Dandenong - *the* most culturally diverse municipality in Australia.

For over 30 years, the oldest IFN in Australia has achieved many things with past activities drawing international and national recognition and much acclaim. The Network has been the recipient of a Premier's Award for its contribution to multicultural community harmony. It has been prominent in bringing faith traditions together in times of international stress and disaster via public gatherings, and continues to conduct its popular *Tours to Places of Worship*. It was also influential in working with the Dandenong hospital to create one of the first multifaith sacred spaces in a hospital.

The IFN attends the new Mayor's induction each year, offers prayers at fortnightly council meetings, holds Annual Gatherings of the IFN and the Greater Dandenong Combined Schools Group, annually hosts a breakfast in the United Nations World Interfaith Harmony Week and hosts Talking Faith? Forums in partnership with the libraries. As well as meeting monthly, the IFN is the first IFN in Victoria to form an Interfaith Bell Choir and employ a part time IFN Development Officer.

Among its many activities over the years, the IFN has held a grassroots conference, launched a website and produced a 20th year celebratory calendar. It has also produced 2 short histories, a recipe book "All Things Rice" with local schools, as well as producing a DVD of its work. "The Welcome Tours", an uplifting documentary about refugees & asylum seekers visiting places of worship was produced and in partnership with council, a faith-based resource "Promoting Equality & Respect: An Interfaith Collaboration on Preventing Family Violence", referred to in the Royal Commission into Family Violence Report, was also produced. In this, its 30th year, the IFN has produced a Places of Worship Coffee Table Book titled: "Many Faiths, One People".

Baha'i Faith - Unity in Diversity

The oneness of humanity is the central principle of the Baha'i Faith. The Prophet-Founder of the Baha'i Faith, Baha'u'llah, said: 'The earth is but one country and mankind its citizens'. The diversity of the human family should be the cause of abiding love and harmony, 'as it is in music where many different notes blend together in the making of a perfect chord.' The Baha'i stand will include information on the Baha'i Faith and on our community-building activities, which include devotional gatherings, children's classes, the junior youth spiritual empowerment program and study circles. These activities are open to everyone.

Sikhism - Try on a Turban

Sikhism is the only religion in the world which requires its followers to tie a turban. Hence a turban is an article of faith. Turbans can be different colours, styles and types but they are not hats. Sikhs tie their turbans a new each day. Visit our stand and try on a Turban.

Islam - Arabic Calligraphy

Arabic calligraphy is considered the quintessential art form of the Islamic world. While some of the best examples of calligraphic writing make this art form appear effortless, each letter and diacritical mark is the result of painstaking measurements and multiple strokes. Visit our stand to have your name written in Arabic calligraphy.

Hinduism - Henna Painting (Mehendi) & Bindi

The art of applying henna to the hands and feet is known as Mehendi, and is traditionally used for Hindu festivals and celebrations as well as rites of passage. A bindi is a small red dot that symbolises the mystic third eye, the central point of the base of creation. Visit our stand and try on some henna painting and/or a bindi.
